


Joining up the dots:

The Childhood Development Initiative (CDI):

- Evolved through a community based consortium;
- Strategy based on there years consultation and research;
- €15M committed by OMCYA and Atlantic Philanthropies;
- Significant evaluation and service design requirements.




What Helps Interagency

- Resources;
- Clear roles and responsibilities;
- Steering group
- Plans and processes
- Good relationships
- Strong communication and interpersonal skills;
- Effective leadership;
- Political support;
- Training;
- Research.

- Schools as employers of Healthy School Coordinators;
- Inter-disciplinary co-facilitation;
- Youth services delivering within schools;
- HSE providing professional role support;
- Interagency collaboration re SLT provision;
- Inter-agency Implementation Support Group;
- Inter-agency sub committees progressing specific actions.


What Helped?

- General acceptance of need for collaboration;
- Children's Services Committee;
- Personalities;
- Structures → Clear terms of reference;
 - → Well run meetings ;
 - → Hospitality;
- CDI as a commissioning agent rather than a service provider i.e. the 'honest broker';
- Doing the leg work e.g. drawing up contracts, MOU's, TOR's etc.;
- Social opportunities for networking e.g. volleyball; lunchtime seminars;
- Quick wins;
- Having a remit to support collaboration;
- High local profile and recognised as a potential vehicle to inform policy and practice.



The Key Challenges:

- Collective amnesia!
- Fear of competition;
- Concern re: evaluation methods;
- Risk of over burdening;
- Defensiveness feeling threatened.



In Conclusion:

- Honesty is in fact the best policy;
- It's all about balance:
 - Consultation v's getting the job done;
 - Quality service delivery v's research requirements;
 - Tenacity v's "nagging";
- Identify your allies and ignore the begrudges (for now).
